Our strategic priorities

Improving experience for consumers and whānau

- People and whānau are the centre of the health and disability system and partner actively in determining their care

Embedding and enacting Te Tiriti o Waitangi, supporting mana motuhake

- The health and disability system supports and partners with Māori to achieve the health outcomes that they determine as priorities

Achieving health equity

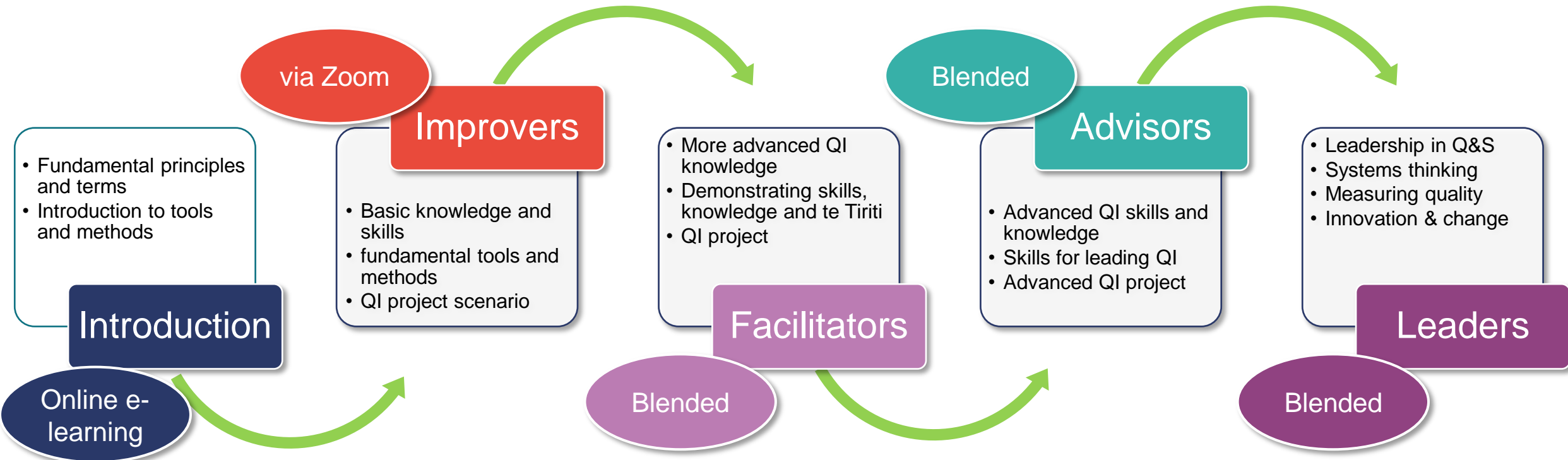
- Health equity is embedded into all aspects of the health and disability system and into the care relationship

Strengthening systems for quality services

- A stronger health and disability system is proactive and anticipates quality and safety issues. Its leaders authentically focus on trust, partnerships and knowledge-sharing

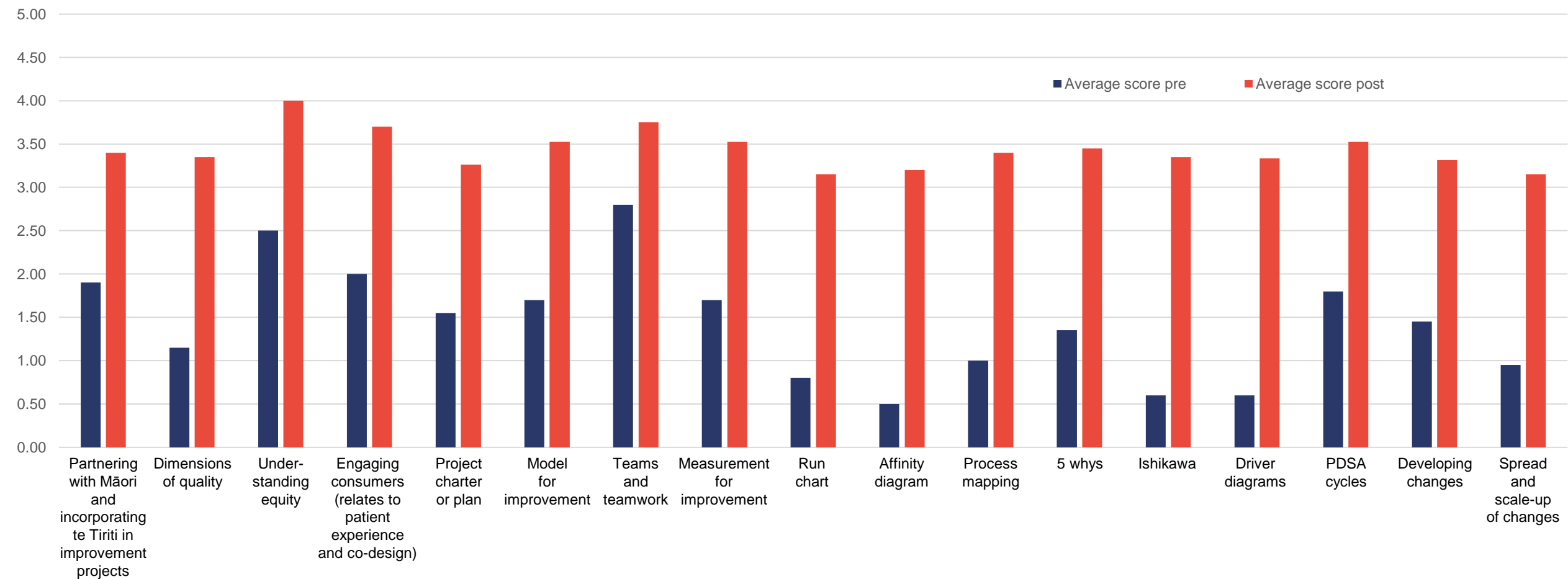


Improvers – Primary Care

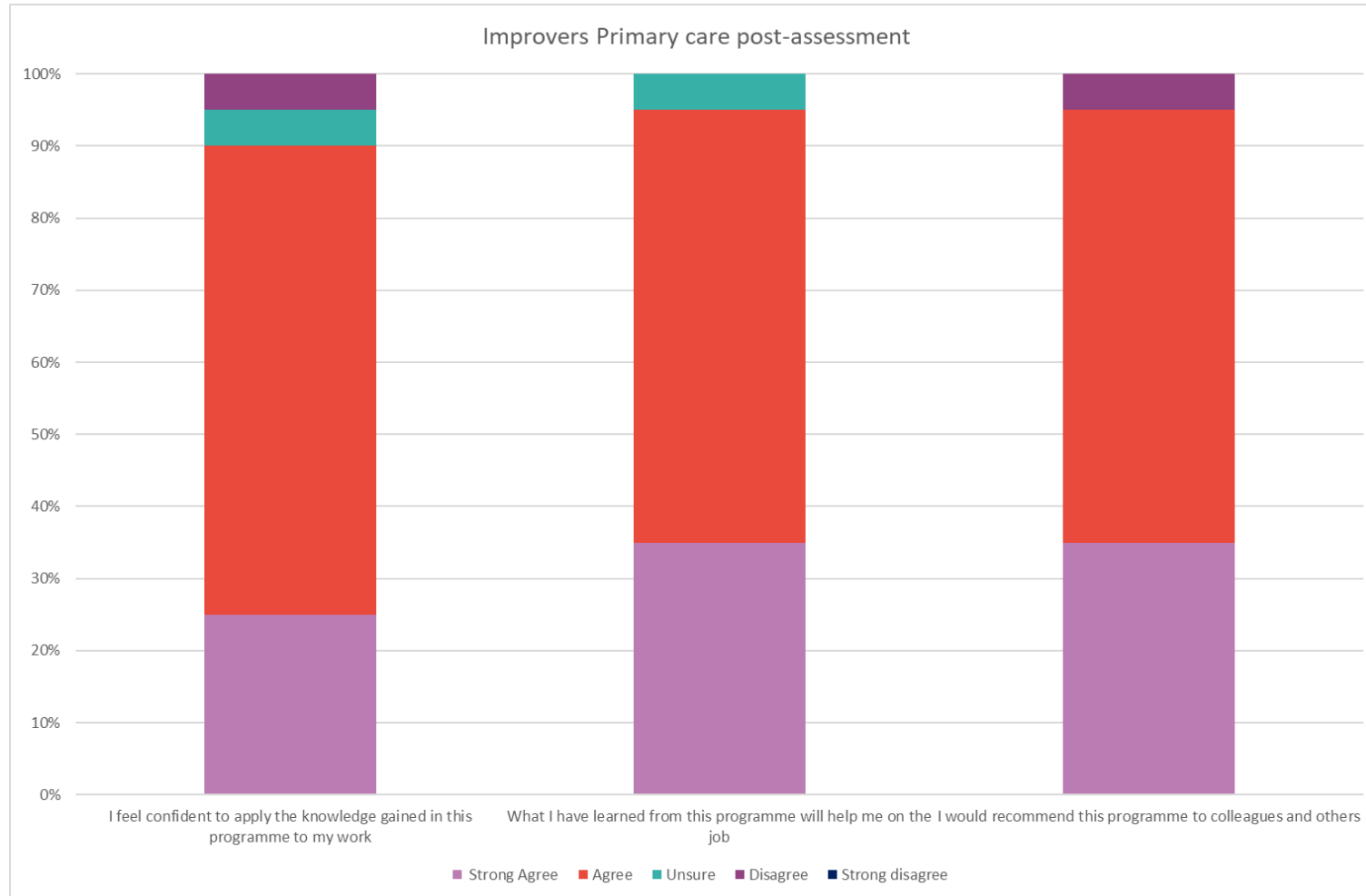
- 16 September – 18 December 2021
- Approximately 50 people registered
- 40 people completed the initial assessment
- 26 people completed the programme
- 20 people who had completed the initial assessment completed the final assessment.

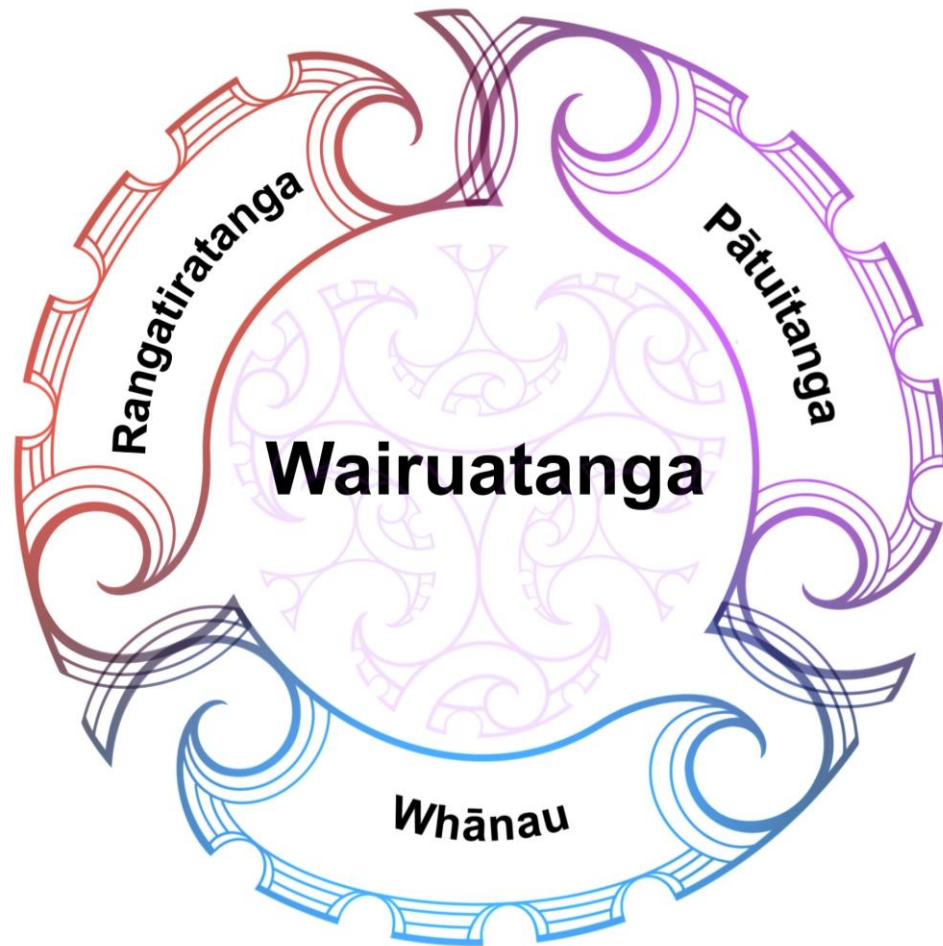


But are we meeting our strategic objectives?

- Is te ao Māori embedded throughout the programmes?
- Will this programme support the system to enact and embed te Tiriti and mana motuhake
- Can we attract greater Māori engagement?
- We moved to redesign the curriculum using the Commission's Te Ao Māori Framework



Te ao Māori framework



- **Purpose:** Advance the uptake and implementation of te ao Māori and mātauranga Māori into health system design and health practice.
- **Intent:** Improve the quality of care delivered to whānau Māori and address inequity in the current health system.



Re-designing the curriculum

- The framework was used to weave te ao Māori and mātauranga throughout the curriculum.
- We used a co-design and co-delivery approach.



The re-design process

- **Wairuatanga:** te ao Māori and mātauranga Māori was the foundation of programme design and delivery rather than an add-on
- **Pātuitanga:** we collaborated and tested our design with kaupapa Māori health providers
- **Rangatiratanga:** we partnered with Māori experts, both internal and external, to the Commission
- **Whānau:** the programme will be tested and evaluated informed by whānau voice.



The curriculum

- looks at quality improvement through a te ao Māori perspective
- focuses strongly on mana motuhake

Working in partnership:

- be prepared to do things differently
- move out of your comfort zone.
